A session focused on preventing, recognizing, and treating environmental injuries. Topics under discussion will include hypothermia, frostbite, heat exhaustion, heat stroke, and severe allergic reactions including anaphylaxis.

AMC incident data tells us that environmental factors (including heat and cold-related illnesses and injuries and interactions with insects such as ticks or bees) are the second largest contributor to total incidents on AMC activities.

Lumber, Bread, and Roses: Logging Labor History of Northern Maine

Forestry work has long been misunderstood and sidelined throughout its 400-year history in Maine. As Maine's forests come under threat from development and climate change, their significance as a bastion of ecological integrity and as a critical carbon sink. Forest workers find themselves yet again at the forefront of technological change and environmental stewardship in an uncertain world, a position they have long held with little recognition. This talk will explore the history of woods labor and its place in rural Maine to help explain how we arrived at this moment and the role land conservation can play in providing new opportunities for these communities.

Women Leading in Conservation at AMC

Although many women hikers and guides came before them, women started working at AMC huts and lodges for the first time during World War II and have not stopped breaking barriers since. The first all-women hut croo were at Lonesome Lake in 1979, the same year the first female research director led our science efforts. AMC's first female CEO broke the glass ceiling in 2022. In this crosscutting session, we will hear from women who are leading conservation efforts today at AMC, including our science, outreach and communications, volunteer engagement, trails, and chapter activities. In a panel discussion, we will share stories of how our experiences have shaped our perspectives and help make our work more relevant to the expanding community of women in the outdoors.

Beyond Bathrooms: Creating A Trans-Affirmative Community

The Venture Out Project

This interactive 100-min workshop will bring groups from a foundational understanding of transgender issues and identity to assessing and creating plans for building more trans-affirming communities. We will engage participants through small-group discussions and a collective whiteboard. In each session, participants will practice and deepen their knowledge of (trans) gender-related vocabulary, identify ways they can be supportive and inclusive of trans people in their community, expand their knowledge of pronouns and gendered language, and work through scenarios related to their role and position in their community.

How LWCF Funds Can Advance Highland Trail Equity & Access Efforts

The Highlands Trail is part of a larger vision to develop a trail network through the entire four-state Mid-Atlantic Highlands Region (CT, NY, NJ, and PA). As a part of this initiative, AMC staff and partners recently published an assessment and interactive map for a portion of the Highlands Trail which explored opportunities to better accommodate users with varying sets of abilities and investigated systemic barriers to trail access for environmental justice communities adjacent to the trail network. The Land and Water Conservation Fund (LWCF) was established by Congress in 1964 to fulfill a bipartisan commitment to safeguard natural areas, water resources, and cultural heritage, and to provide recreation opportunities to all Americans. AMC staff will discuss how LWCF dollars can support accessible trails, using the Equity and Accessibility Assessment as an example project.



An Indigenous Site Survey of the New England National Scenic Trail

The Indigenous Site Survey Project Report details the Indigenous and Tribal history along the New England National Scenic Trail (NET). This is a collective effort to explore and discover the Indigenous history of the land on the Menunkatuck Trail and the historic Mattabesett,

Metacomet, and Monadnock Trail Systems, now recognized and celebrated as the New England National Scenic Trail. Through the development of a Historical Survey of the trail corridor, focusing on the trail's tribal history, we plan to map the intersection of outdoor recreation, tribal history, and historic preservation. Our goal is to engage our local communities with this vital, yet often forgotten, history along the NET, identify key conservation and preservation initiatives, and create deeper collaboration with local tribal communities. Join Jay Levy, Tribal Consultant for the New England Trail and Miriam Maistelman, AMC New England Trail Coordinator, in a conversation about the project, its development, and how we will use these findings as a framework to navigate the future of conservation.

Advancing Racial Equity in Outdoor Institutions

Why and how have People of Color been excluded from full participation in nature spaces and outdoor sports? Please join us in welcoming Mardi Fuller, a lifelong backcountry adventurer, who in January 2021 became the first-known Black person to hike all 48 of New Hampshire's high peaks in winter. Mardi will take us on a brief, but deep dive into understanding white supremacy and how it normalizes its own experiences, history, narratives, and environmental ideology. Mardi will speak on her life of adventures as a Black outdoorswoman who has grown into her liberation-focused identity. We'll discuss barriers marginalized people face in accessing the outdoors and how their exclusion is detrimental to all people. We'll end by discussing solutions and how each of us can play a role in increasing equitable access to nature and outdoor activities.
